
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**Observance of the 150th Anniversary of
The War Between the States Continues**



1864

As the Fall season began so did the beginning of the fall of the Confederacy. There were very few bright spots, let alone victories for our beloved men of the South. While most of the major action during the summer months took place in the Eastern Theatre between General Robert E. Lee's Confederates and General Ulysses S. Grant's federals it would be the Western Theater taking center stage in the Fall. There were many battles and skirmishes but certainly the Battles of Atlanta, Franklin, and subsequent Battle of Nashville, all ending in Union victories that caused the most devastation.

I'm certain you the readers do not need this newsletter Editor to print an in-depth account of those painful losses. Instead let's revisit a celebrated Confederate moment back up in the Eastern theatre that occurred in September of 1864.

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Petersburg, Virginia

September 5th, 1864, Robert E. Lee's Army was facing severe shortages of food and supplies. Grant had spent a good portion of the late summer cutting off supply routes Lee needed to provide food and other supplies to his Army. One of Lee's scouts, George D. Shadburn returned from a reconnaissance mission to survey Union defenses to the east of Petersburg. Shadburn believed he found a vulnerability and reported it to the leader of Lee's cavalry, Gen. Wade Hampton. He told Hampton about a herd of 3,000 cattle that were being kept at a place called Coggins Point, just a few miles away from the Union base at City Point and was being guarded by less than 150 soldiers. Even so, it was a very risky opportunity because it was deep into the Union line. Hampton had only been in charge of the Cavalry Corps a few months having been put in charge by General Lee after the tragic death of General J.E.B. Stewart at the Battle of Yellow Tavern. Looking for an opportunity to show General Lee he was the right choice to succeed the famous General, Hampton jumped at the chance.

On the morning of September 14th, Hampton embarked on his raid with 3,000 Confederates. They traveled around the south side of Petersburg undetected, stopping only to repair a bridge on the Blackwater River in order to reach Coggins Point. The bridge, which had previously been destroyed by Union forces, made for an unexpected route for their surprise raid. At 5:00 AM on September 16th, the raid commenced. Despite the Federals best attempt to hold them off, the Confederates parted with 2,486 cattle and 304 Yankee prisoners. Ten Confederates were killed in the surprise raid and on September 17th, Hampton arrived back behind Confederate lines with all but 18 head of the herd. The "Great Beefsteak Raid" as it would be remembered supplied the rebel army at Petersburg with many days of abundant feasts of steak. There was a great deal of taunting going out to the Union soldiers across the trench lines thanking them for their generosity and inviting them over for dinner.

Clearly aggravated, Grant when asked by a visitor to his headquarters when he thought they'd be able to end the siege of Petersburg and drive Lee into surrender, he replied "Never, if our armies continue to supply him with beef cattle."

Old Business

Upon taking office at the DCV annual convention in Round Rock, Texas last February President von Roeder asked DCV Parliamentarian Steve Lucas to do a review of the DCV Constitution. It had been pointed out the Constitution contains a number of redundancies and a general review of the document was appropriate. The review has been completed and a number of "house cleaning" recommendations were presented to the Board. After some discussion the Board voted to accept the recommendations. Any amendments to the DCV Constitution requires membership approval. The list of proposed amendments approved by the Board is being written by Steve Lucas and will be published in a special edition of the DCV TRAVELLER and sent to the entire membership. Voting on the amendments will take place during the 2015 annual DCV Convention.







IN THEIR OWN WORDS



"During the past summer and fall I passed over roads that the 1st Tennessee went over from August to December, 1861. I walked to the spot where General Lee's tent stood on Valley Mountain from where on a point near by I could see Mingo Flats and Cheat Mountain along which great sides we clamored for several days and where we had our first fight on the summit in a blackberry patch. I could also see where old Colonel John H. Savage captured thirty yankees by himself on foggy morning on September 11, 1861. They were in a house, and their guns were stacked outside. His men had captured the Vidette, and he rushed ahead of the advanced guard and getting between the yankees and their guns, made them surrender. At Big Spring I found our old camp, through Major Cam Gatewood, who pointed out the cold spring from which I drank again from after an absence of over thirty-four years. A store house stands where our Regiment camped and where one of the Company's Captains accidentally discharged his gun while cleaning it and killed one of Colonel Hatton's men of the Seventh."
