

These new members filled their respective offices upon their induction to our Chapter.



Born 1729 in County Armagh, Ulster, Ireland, John Honeyman was a son of Scottish parents. Honeyman was characterized as a Somerset County, New Jersey (NJ) farmer with little formal schooling, live stockman and farmer after age 29. In 1758, he was conscripted by the British Army and transplanted to North America via Canada, serving on Maj. Gen'l. James Wolfe's (1727-1759) staff. Wolfe died in 1759 at the *Plains of Abraham* in Quebec, fighting the French; source, Find A Grave Memorial #: 7699297.

John was discharged and migrated to the American colony where he married 1st, Mary Henry in Sep 1764 at Philadelphia. Children born from this marriage were recorded as sons, John Honeyman, Jr., b. 1769; James, b. 1776 and daughters, Jane; Margaret; Mary; Eleanor and Sarah. Wolfe had advised Honeyman to locate and contact a Colonial American associate, Cmdr., George Washington. George Washington was acquainted with John from the British fighting in Quebec, when Honeyman was selected by Maj Gen'l. Wolfe as a *trusted* Life-Guard. After 1759 Siege of Quebec, Wolfe had told Honeyman that he'd soon be honorably discharged. Wolfe suggested before his death that (Colonel) Washington would make an excellent contact if Honeyman wished to relocate to the American colony. By 1770, he had resettled to a farming tract at Somerset, NJ, where he would confidentially agree to furnish vital intelligence serving Cmdr., George Washington's decisive battle of Trenton held on 26 Dec 1776; see, *Sons of the American Revolution, West Virginia Society (SAR) Application For Membership* approved 15 Sep 1943 for William Herbert Childs, Nat'l. Number 62640, State No. 575.

Bruce Chadwick's Copyright 2004 book, *George Washington's War* published by Sourcebooks, Inc., at Naperville, Illinois noted that British Army routing of the Continental Army at Harlem Heights and White Plains underscored the loss of five thousand Americans killed or captured during the New York campaign. So, affected were the Americans that Gen'l. Washington moved south across NJ to encamp on the opposite bank of the Delaware river at Washington Crossing facing the combined British forces led by William Howe and Lord Charles Cornwallis. Chadwick described the frigid, snowy Christmas of 1776, and Washington's crude hospitals (see: *Thompson-Neely House*) set along the Southbank of the Delaware a few miles from his Washington Crossing HQ. Here, Washington and several Life-Guard collected intelligence by scouting Honeyman's farm at Somerset County. Chadwick wrote that Washington decided to strategize an American assault upon the Hessian barracks commanded by Colonel Johann Rall after derelictions of leadership were revealed by Honeyman, still affecting his brogue, to gain Rall's trust on numerous visits to supply the barracks with beef and farm produce. On pgs 10 and 11, Chadwick recorded, "Now when details on Hessian daily routines were needed most," Honeyman *confidentially* furnished information to Washington relative to Hessian troops, Ralls' thinking, derelictions, approach roads to Trenton and locations to cross the river.

Separately, a well noted, retired CIA case officer Kenneth A. Daigler documented in Chapter 7 of his book Spies, Patriots, and Traitors: American Intelligence in the Revolutionary War, Copyright 2014, Georgetown Univ., Press, Washington, DC, pgs 128-130 and 244, "the role of the American spy John Honeyman must also be considered." The oral story of Honeyman's actions is quite detailed, fits in well with the information known about the tactical situation at Trenton. Washington had the experience and determination to effectively conduct from an intelligence officer's prospective, an assault. However, considering Washington's strong sense of operational security to protect his sources and methods of gathering intelligence, I do not find the lack of supporting government or army records surprising. Daigler submitted that in late December, Honeyman was "captured" and taken to Gen'l. Washington, where he furnished his complete intelligence report on the enemy at Trenton. In addition to incorporating this intelligence into a plan of attack, Washington also instructed Honeyman to escape and report back to Johann Rall about his capture, escape and that from his observation the American army was inactive in quarters for the Christmas period. Honeyman did so, and departed barracks at Trenton and returned to his farm. He joined his family at Griggstown, but remained under suspicion of Tory sentiments until the end of the war.

Honeyman's wife, Mary Henry died on 24 Jun 1801 and John re-married in 1804, a widow Elizabeth Estel (aka Estelle) Burrows. At age 93, John Honeyman's death was recorded on 18 Aug 1822 and his burial was mapped at Lamington Presbyterian Church Cemetery, Lamington Road, Bedminster, Somerset County, NJ, 07921 at GPS -Latitude: 40.6607, Longitude: -74.7188; source, Find A Grave Memorial #: 7699297

John Marshall was born at home in Fauquier County (Co,) Virginia on 24 Sep 1755. He was the 4th son born to Thomas Marshall [(1730-1802), SAR Patriot #: P-241920] and Mary Randolph Keith (1737-1809), recorded married during 1754 at Fauquier /fɔ: 'kɪər/ County (Co,) formed 1758 from Prince William Co, Virginia (VA); sources, U.S. and International Marriage Records, 1560-1900, source no. 1371.101; family group sheet, FGSE listed as parents and also, Biological Directory of the U.S. Congress, 1774-2005 /John Marshall.

In Jul 1775, after Royal Governor John Dunmore had removed the Virginia colony's powder stores and abandoned the capital at Williamsburg, several revolutionary conventions had met at Richmond for the purpose of forming a provisional government headed by a "Committee of Safety." The results were the authorization and creation of 2 regts., of regular troops recruited by Cols. Patrick Henry and William Woodford and 16 bttns. of minutemen for defense purposes against British invasion and insurrection. Major Thomas Marshall of Fauquier Co, was selected to the Gen'l Staff of Col. Lawrence Taliaferro of Orange Co, VA. Maj. Marshall was accompanied by a son, John Marshall, age 19 appointed as Lieut. in a company led by Capt. William Pickett; source, An 18th Century Perspective: Culpeper County compiled by Mary Stevens Jones and publ. by the Culpeper Historical Society, Inc., Culpeper, VA, 1976, Chapter II, 'All Fine Fellows and Well Armed' pgs 15-19. During the 2nd Continental Congress held Sep 1776, this body of VA Militia was attached to the newly organized 11th VA Regt. raised for the Continental Army.

On 26 Jan 1833, John Marshall (4th US Chief Justice) appeared within the WDC, District Court. **He petitioned for Pension Application S.5731 that he was age 77, and a resident of Richmond, VA.** He gave an oath that he had entered the military service of the United Colonies during Jul 1776 in Capt. William Blackwell's company raised for Fauquier Co, VA Militia Regt. A part of the combined Fauquier, Culpeper, Orange Co, VA Regt., had previously been marched by Col Daniel Morgan to defend Washington Heights in Nov 1776 where it was surrendered, before he had joined.


In early 1777, his company was attached to the new 11th VA Regt., Continental Army commanded by Cols. Daniel Morgan and Hans Christian Febiger, 2nd VA Regt. The deponent stated, he recalled being commissioned a Capt. during May 1777 while in [2nd Division, 3rd VA Bgde., (BrigGen'l William Woodford) 11th VA Regt.] continental service. He recalled engagements in the battles of Brandywine [11 Sep 1777], German Town [4 Oct 1777], and Monmouth [28 Jun 1778], and in some skirmishes, marching in Maryland, Delaware, Pennsylvania, NJ and NY; source, http://revwarapps.org/s5731.pdf i.e., Southern Campaigns

American Revolution Pension Statements and Rosters; also see, Philadelphia 1777: Taking the capital, publ. by Osprey Publ., 2007, Midland House, Oxford, Great Britain, American Forces, 2nd Division (MajGen'l Adam Stephen), 3rd VA Bgde, pg 24.

Prior to John Marshall's widely known diplomatic and political achievements, he visited Williamsburg, VA where George Wythe welcomed him to enroll at the College of William and Mary to practice law. He was admitted to the bar on 28 Aug 1780. John Marshall, often visited Wythe's home and study like area scholars Geo. Washington, Thos. Jefferson and James Monroe; source, I Am Murdered: George Wythe..., the Killing That Shocked a New Nation, Copyright 2009, Bruce Chadwick, publ. by John Wiley & Sons, Inc. Hoboken, NJ, pgs 7, 71, 118-119 -see: John Marshall, Chief Justice US Supreme Court ruling *Marbury vs. Madison* that the federal Constitution superseded all state and local laws giving enormous power to the federal government. He resigned his army commission during 1781, practiced law in Fauquier Co., and, was elected to serve in the VA House of Delegates at Richmond.

At age 27, John's marriage to Mary Willis Ambler was recorded on 11 Jan 1783 at Henrico Co, an original shire; source, Marriage Bonds of Henrico Co, VA 1782-1853 compiled by Michael Pollock, Copyright 1984, publ. by Genealogical Publ., Co., Inc., Balt., MD, pg 108. His wife, Mary, died in Richmond, Henrico Co, during 1831 and the couple was survived by numerous adult children. Mary Ambler's parents were Jacque (aka Jacquelin) Ambler and Rebecca L. Burwell of York Co, VA, an original shire. Her husband, John Marshall died 6 Jul 1835 at Philadelphia, PA and was buried at Shockoe Hill Cemetery Hospital Street, Richmond, VA 23219; source Virginia Historical Marker No. SA 4, mapped at Latitude: 37.5523 and Longitude: -77.4309
