Earl Scott was my Great Uncle and V. Lee Scott was my Great Grandfather.








Much of the woodwork, railings and pulpit were done by V. Lee Scott

Thaddeus Sobieski Constantine Lowe demonstrated the use of hydrogen-filled a in balloon aerial reconnaissance through a series of tethered ascents in June 1861 in front of the Washington Armory, which sat on

the site now occupied by the National Air and Space Museum. His most significant ascent took place on June 16, 1861, when along with telegrapher Herbert Robinson and George Burns, Robinson's supervisor at the telegraph company, Lowe ascended to a height of 500 feet, from which they transmitted a telegraph to the White House describing their view of an "area near fifty miles in diameter." The success of the demonstration flight garnered enthusiastic support of President Abraham Lincoln and Gen. George B. McClellan, leading to the adoption of balloon reconnaissance by the Union Army and the creation of its Balloon Corps. The first reconnaissance balloon, the Union, entered service on August 2, 1861.

GAINES' MILL

In the afternoon of June 27, 1862, Confederate General Robert E. Lee attacked General Fitz John Porter's isolated V Corps at Gaines' Mill. The battle at Gaines' Mill was the second in a series of engagements known as the Seven Days Battles that drove General George McClellan's Union army from the doorsteps of Richmond.

It was a Confederate victory. After holding off the majority of a series of Confederate attacks for most of the afternoon, Porter's line began to crumble that evening, and his men fled towards the Chickahominy River.

On the night of June 18-19, 1864, Confederate Gen. Joseph E. Johnston moved into a defensive position on Kennesaw Mountain in Georgia. Having

encountered entrenched Rebels there stretching southward, Maj. Gen. William T. Sherman extended his right to envelop their flank with Maj. Gen. John Schofield's Army of the Ohio. Johnston countered by moving Lt. Gen. John B. Hood's corps from his right flank to his left on June 22 to confront Schofield. Hoping to flank Schofield, Hood attacked, moving down Powder Springs-Marietta Road toward the farm of Peter Kolb. Schofield and Maj. Gen. Joseph Hooker's XX Corps from the Army of the Cumberland in line there held firm. Union artillery and swampy terrain thwarted Hood's attack and forced him to withdraw with 1,500 casualties. Although the victor, Sherman's attempts at envelopment had momentarily failed.
